

A message from the Head of School: Mr Billyeald

Dear Families,

As we get to the end of another school year, I thought it would be nice to reflect on some of our achievements:

This year we have been incredibly fortunate to receive some funding from The Rigby foundation as part of their 'Inspiring Futures' programme. The Charity was set up by Sir Peter Rigby and Patricia Rigby in 1992. The Foundation now supports young people from low-income backgrounds in the West Midlands, helping them to access the best education possible and to have the chance of securing meaningful and sustainable employment. The funding they have provided will enable us to work with 4 charity partners next year:

- Place to be providing us with a dedicated mental health professional to work with our students as required.
- Into University who will work with students to provide Academic support and mentoring both in school and at their centre in Kitts Green.
- Zero Gravity who provide a mentoring programme and online platform for Sixth form students to promote access to university.
- Envision a group that work with our year 9 students developing and evaluating community action projects.

We have also had numerous trips and visits (over 80 during the course of the year!) including:

- The Year 7 outdoor education visit to Blackwell Adventure.
- Trips to Stratford and Carding Mill Valley for our Year 10 geographers.
- Trips to the Imperial War Museum and Cadbury World for our year 10 historians.
- Reward trips for all year groups to Drayton Manor and Alton Towers.

- Trips for year 8 and year 9 students to Aston University and Oxford University.
- A Sixth form trip to KPMG where students got the opportunity to develop their skills to support applications to university and apprenticeships.
- Our annual Year 10 trip to Barcelona.



Rocks, Rivers & Rambles: A Journey Through Carding Mill Valley

This term, our Year 10 Geography group visited Carding Mill Valley, in Shropshire, to investigate how rivers change as they move downstream. The trip was a chance to put classroom theory into action and complete one part of their GCSE fieldwork studies. Armed with wellies, measuring tapes, and clipboards, we set off to explore the River Ashbrook. One of the first unexpected challenges was... horses! A group of them were relaxing right where we needed to access the river, and it took a bit of gentle encouragement (and some very cautious walking) to get them to move along.

Once in the river, we measured depth, width, and velocity at different points along the stream. Everything was going well until one student – who will remain nameless for dignity's sake – managed to fall in the river not once, but twice! Thankfully, he was fine, spending lunch under the very weak hand dryers in the car park toilets.

It was a brilliant day overall – not just fun, but really useful for helping us understand how rivers develop from source to mouth. Plus, we got to see the physical processes in action, which definitely beats looking at diagrams on a whiteboard! The next fieldwork trip to Stratford-Upon-Avon will take place in July - where we will steer well clear of the river!
